# **Training Resources for IIS Trainers**

An IIS Trainer is a highly specialized position. It is unlikely that any new trainer will come prepared with all the skills and knowledge to perform this role. To adequately prepare IIS trainers, we recommend, that new trainers be assessed for their:

- a. **Expertise in training design and delivery** (classroom, webinar, as it applies to your IIS)
- b. **Knowledge of immunization** (especially vaccines and schedules)
- c. Experience with the state's IIS registry application

As such, IIS trainer training should follow these two tracks\*:

- 1. Professional trainers who are new to IIS (focus on learning subject matter)
- 2. Technical or public health professionals who become trainers (subject matter experts in b or c who need to learn how to design and deliver training)

## **Track 1: Subject Matter Expertise**

Prepares new IIS trainers to be competent in the subject areas of immunization and your IIS. We recommend that trainers have access to these tools and resources.

#### **IIS Training Tools**

Most of these resources will be specific to your own IIS application. The trainer should be fully conversant with your IIS functionality in order to train others on to use it. Your new trainer should be familiar with training tools your IIS has already developed and able to help update them.

IIS program demonstration of data entry and basic registry functions
Access to the IIS application (training database) to practice using the registry
IIS training tools, as tip sheets/job aids, user manual, pre-recorded webinars,
online courses, etc. should be made available to the IIS Trainer
Standard PPT/agenda/learning objectives
Evaluation strategies and metrics, if used.
A review of error reports and an opportunity to speak to Help Desk in order to
understand common problems that may be addressed through training
American Immunization Registry Association (AIRA) MIROW Guides, SnapShots
newsletter, and other general IIS resources.

### **Track 2: Training Competency**

It's likely that some IIS trainers will come from public health or technical backgrounds, but may not have training in being a trainer. Training is a skill and learning more about what makes a training effective will give trainers some clear strategies for success. Below are some resources to consider:
