- Evaluation & Forecasting
 - Consistency
 - Accuracy
 - Timeliness
- IIS Best Practices
 - Common understanding
 - Better alignment
- General Communication
 - Less miscommunication
 - Less rework



Avoiding Errors



Terms:

- Responsible Party: a person responsible for a patient
- Reminder/Recall Notification: a communication indicating that a patient has one or more recommended vaccinations due or past due

Business Rule:

A <u>reminder/recall notification</u> for a patient must be sent to the patient's <u>responsible party</u> if the patient is under 18 years of age.

Potential Outcome:

Reminder/Recall Notification sent to the wrong person.

Avoiding Errors



Options:

- 1. Revise the definition of Responsible Party to be more specific.
- 2. Create a separate concept for people who should receive notifications (e.g., Reminder/Recall Notification Contact).
- 3. Add a rule to indicate which kinds of responsible parties should receive reminder/recall notifications:
 - A reminder/recall notification for a patient may be sent to a responsible party only if the responsible party has one of the following relationships to the patient:
 - Parent
 - Guardian.

Avoiding Ambiguity



Terms:

- Date of Birth: a patient's date of birth
- Minimum Age: the earliest age a vaccine may be administered

Business Rule:

A patient's minimum age date must be calculated as the patient's <u>date of</u>
 <u>birth</u> plus the <u>minimum age</u>.

Potential Outcomes:

- 1. Valid vaccine dose administered is evaluated as invalid (or vice versa).
- 2. Patient is administered a vaccine at the incorrect age
- 1. CDC: CDSi Logic Specification v4.0, p. 31, 110, 112

Avoiding Ambiguity




Option:

1. Revise business rule based on concept/domain model:

A patient's minimum age date *for a series dose* within an antigen series must be calculated as the patient's <u>date of birth</u> plus the <u>minimum age</u> *for the series dose*.

2. Check for comprehension/readability



Avoiding Inconsistency



- 1. A <u>patient series</u> must be considered a <u>scorable patient series</u> if all the following are true:
 - The <u>patient series</u> is a <u>standard patient series</u>
 - The <u>series priority</u> is the same or greater <u>series priority</u> as any <u>patient series</u> within the same <u>series group</u>.
- 2. A <u>patient series</u> must be considered a <u>scorable patient series</u> if all the following are true:
 - The <u>patient series</u> is a <u>regular patient series</u>
 - The <u>series ranking</u> is the same or greater <u>series ranking</u> as any <u>relevant patient</u> <u>series</u> within the same <u>series group</u>.

Avoiding Inconsistency



Potential Outcomes:


- Duplicate rules
- Duplicate implementations
- Rules become out of sync

Options:

- 1. Ensure all rules use defined terms
- 2. Identify synonyms
- 3. Select a "preferred" term and use it everywhere

Naming and Defining Terms Best Practices

- Start with Dictionary definition
- Avoid reiterating the term name
- Focus on what it is
- Omit <u>how</u> it's used
- Avoid embedding rules
- For compound terms, start with the base term, then describe how it is different
- Identify synonyms and select a "preferred" term to be used in all documentation



Writing Business Rules Best Practices



- Be rigorous about using defined terms
- Use "preferred" term when there are synonyms
- "must" and "may...only" vs. "should"
- Start with the subject
- Use bulleted lists
- Be explicit but concise
- Ensure rule is comprehensible
